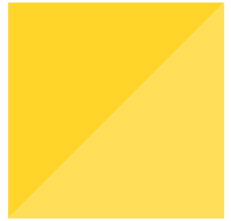

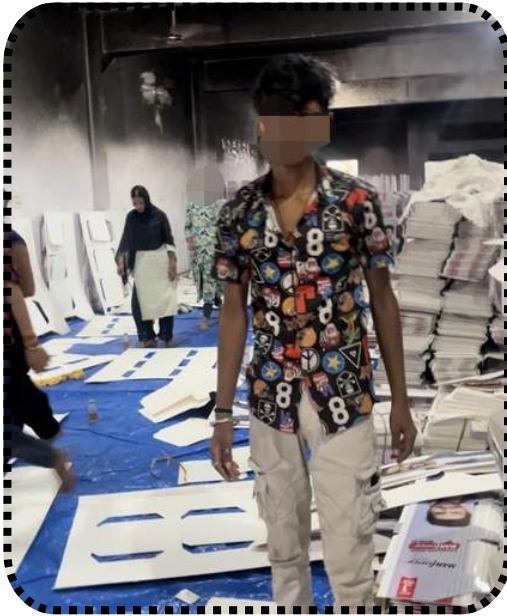

CHILD LABOUR RESCUE & REHABILITATION





In the year **2024-25**, our organization remained steadfast in its mission to **rescue and rehabilitate children under the age of 18** from **hazardous environments**, including **factories and industrial areas** in **Delhi & NCR like Noida, Patel Nagar, Ghaziabad, Nangloi, Civil lines, Rohini, Wazirpur**, and other locations.

Sahyog extended comprehensive support to these rescued children by providing medical care and essential counseling services to help them cope with their traumatic experiences. Following initial care, the children were referred to the **Child Welfare Committee (CWC)** and were subsequently placed in shelter homes, ensuring their safety, protection, and overall well-being.

At Sahyog Care, we firmly believe that every rescued child deserves not only a safe shelter, but also justice and dignity. We take immense pride in ensuring that children receive fair financial compensation for the exploitation and hardship they have endured.

During the year **2024-25**, a total of **1,312** children were rescued from child labour, including **1,081** boys and **231** girls. These children were provided with minimum wage benefits amounting to **₹2,06,39,011**. In addition, awareness was raised among the public under the **Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Amendment Act, 2016**, and efforts were made to ensure compensation for the rescued children.

This financial aid plays a vital role in the rehabilitation of these children and supports them in rebuilding their lives with self-respect and hope for a brighter future. We take these steps to ensure that every child receives their fundamental rights—including safety, education, and the right to live with dignity.



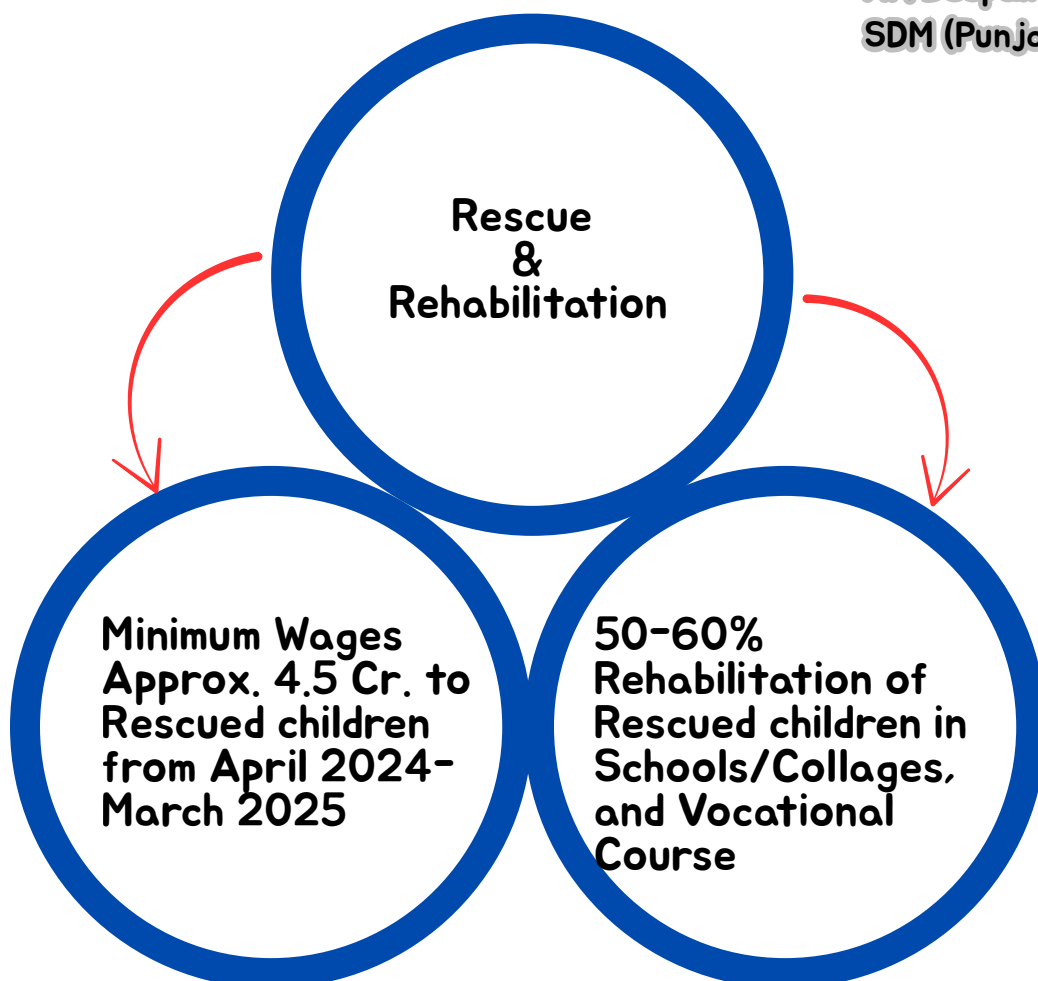
Sahyog Care also took the initiative to enroll each rescued child in either formal education or vocational training institutions. We supplied them with necessary materials such as stationery, books, and school uniforms, thereby creating an environment conducive to learning and growth.

Our dedicated team maintained continuous contact with the rescued children and their families, offering unwavering support and assistance. Furthermore, we aided these families in acquiring essential documents, empowering them to access various opportunities and services, thus contributing to their overall socio-economic development

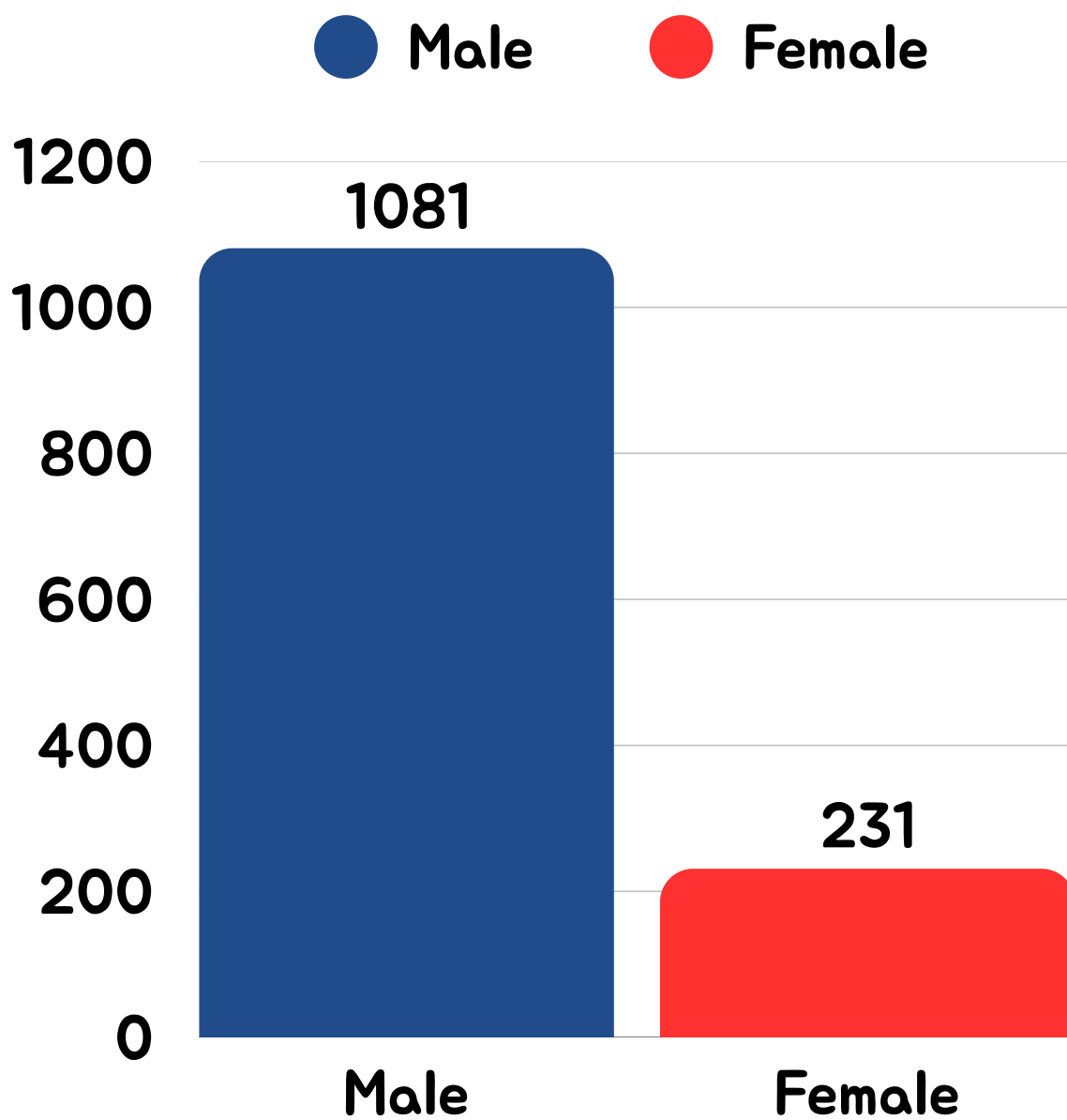

Hope, Health, and Healing: Sahyog Care's Work for Underprivileged Children

A New Life for Young Hearts – A Commitment, A Cause

Medical assistance is one of the truest reflections of a society's compassion and awareness. This year, Sahyog Care prioritized the treatment of underprivileged children suffering from congenital heart defects, cancer, bone marrow disorders, thalassemia, and similar serious conditions. Our mission was clear – no child should lose their life merely due to a lack of financial resources.

Core Objectives:

- To provide timely and accessible medical assistance to children from economically weaker families.
- To identify children suffering from life-threatening diseases, particularly heart-related conditions, and ensure they receive proper treatment.

Key Achievements:

- In the year **2024–25**, Sahyog Care provided essential medical support to **36 children**.
- Many of these cases required immediate surgeries or urgent interventions, which we were able to facilitate promptly.
- In situations where the full treatment cost was not available, Sahyog Care bridged the financial gap using its own funds.

Modes of Assistance:

- Financial Grants
- In-Kind Donations
- Self-Funded Support – through specially allocated internal funds for medical expenses

Geographical Reach.

This year, our efforts expanded across multiple regions of India – including **Delhi, Mumbai, Gurugram, Bengaluru**, and more – ensuring that no child is deprived of medical treatment due to their location or lack of resources.

Inclusive Learning



Sahyog has embarked on a noble journey to improve the lives of underprivileged children who require special care and support. This journey began in **2002**. Our project serves as a beacon of hope, illuminating the path toward a bright and educated future for these vulnerable children, while also enhancing their learning levels.

We have three Remedial Centers (**1-Nilothi, 2-Nihal Vihar, and 3-Tagore Garden**), in these centers we have around **180** children from underprivileged communities for bridge course and remedial.

We believe that education is not merely a tool for acquiring knowledge, but a key that unlocks doors of opportunity and potential. It is the one asset that no one can ever take away from you. Education grows when shared and decays when hoarded.

We offer a comprehensive support system that includes **free teaching and learning assistance, remedial coaching, engaging recreational activities, and essential health and hygiene training**. But our efforts do not stop there. We understand the importance of a conducive learning environment, which is why **Sahyog provides free uniforms and stationery**, ensuring that financial hardships do not hinder a child's education.

We also address the root causes that lead to high dropout rates among these children. To combat this, we actively engage with the children, their parents, and the community, bridging the gaps that often result in disengagement from education.

Our remedial centers are not merely places of learning—they are nurturing spaces where children are encouraged to dream and aspire for a better future.

One of our unique initiatives, '**Wall O Books**', is a testament to our innovative approach. In these remedial centers, children have access to an engaging collection of storybooks and newspapers. This vibrant library becomes a source of inspiration, where children don't just read but apply their learning to real life. It cultivates curiosity, critical thinking, and intellectual growth.

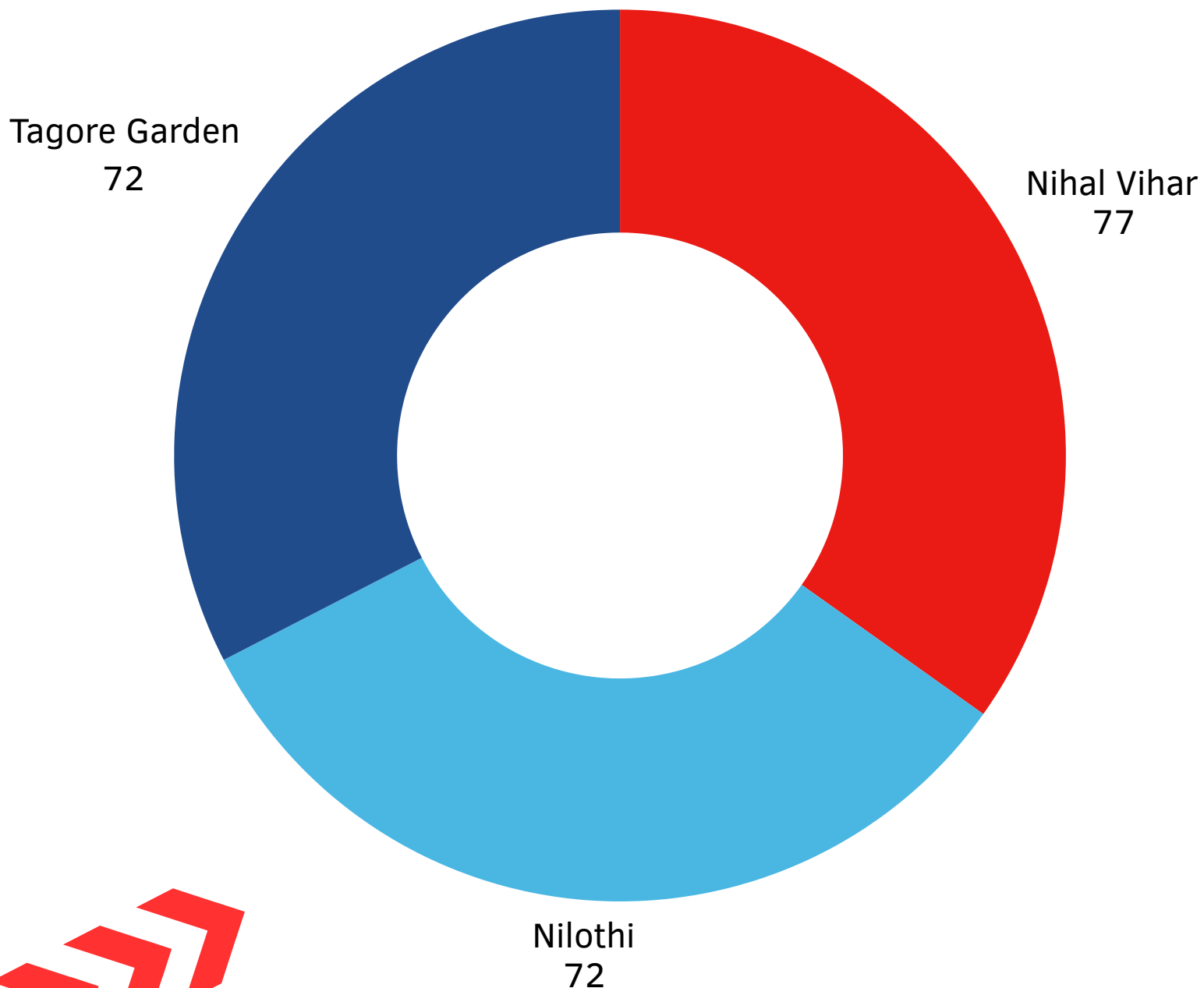

Safe, Clean Toilets — A Basic Right for Every Student

Sanitation in schools is very important because it helps keep children healthy and safe. Clean and well-maintained toilets prevent the spread of diseases and create a better environment for learning. When students have access to proper sanitation, they feel more comfortable and can focus on their studies. Good hygiene practices in schools also teach children lifelong habits that improve their health and well-being.



ROLE OF SAHYOG CARE FOR YOU:

- Conduct assessments to identify the sanitation requirements of schools.
- Collaborate with donors, sponsors, and stakeholders to secure the necessary funds for construction and repairs.
- Develop detailed plans and execute the construction or repair of toilets while ensuring quality standards.
- Engage with schools, students, and the community to promote the importance of hygiene and maintaining clean facilities.
- Oversee and manage the entire process to ensure project objectives are met.
- Implement strategies for long-term maintenance and sustainability to enhance student health and learning environments.



PROGRESS OF THE PROJECT

The project has successfully completed the construction of **3 school toilets in Wazirpur, Jasana and Tajpur in Faridabad And 25 Schools of MCD Delhi** to provide clean and functional facilities for students and staff. Additionally, additional toilets have been successfully constructed in **two other schools (Aitmadpur and Badarpur Said School also in Faridabad)**. These efforts are significantly contributing to improved hygiene and cleanliness in schools, creating a healthier and more supportive learning environment.

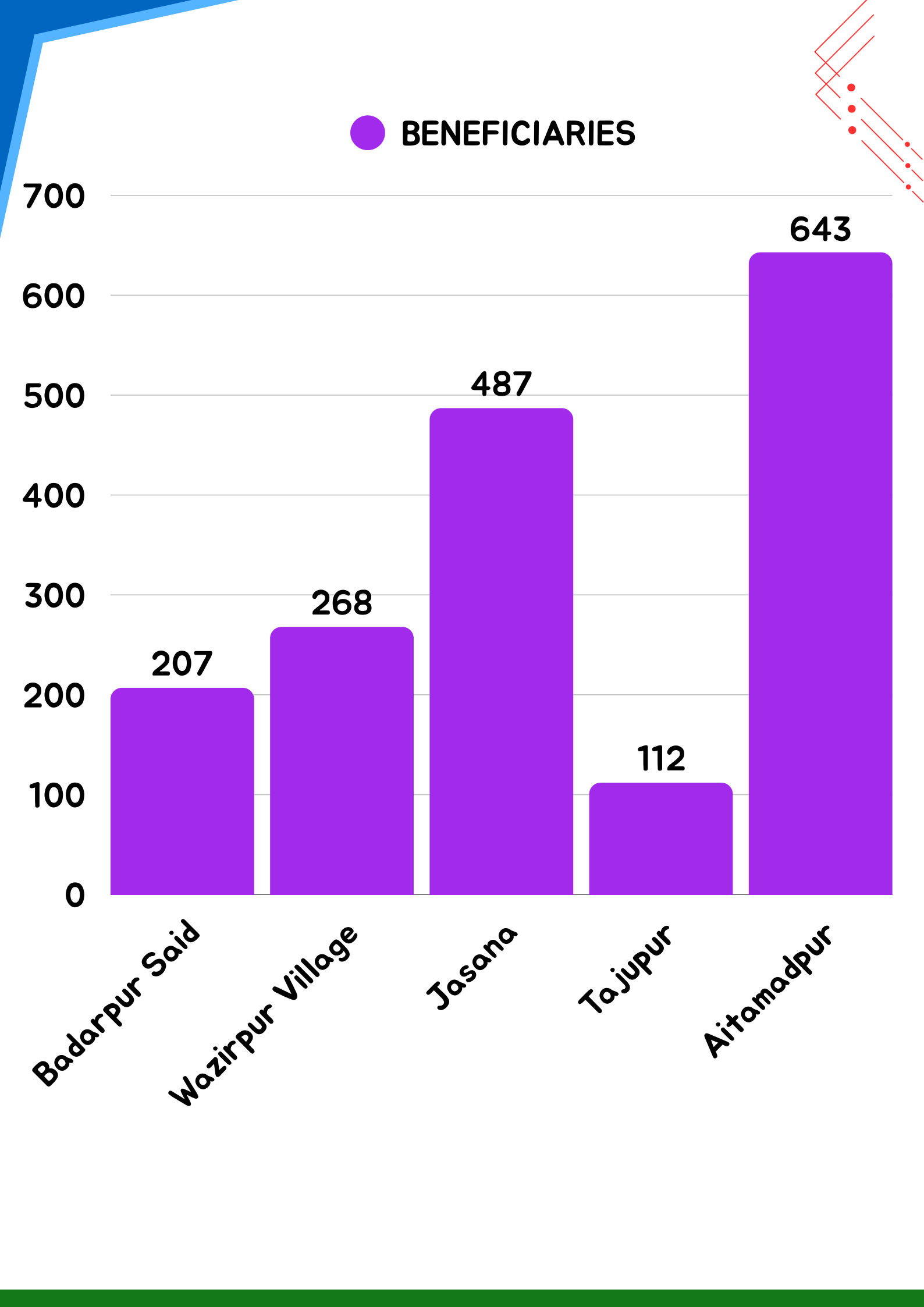


IMPACT SO FAR...

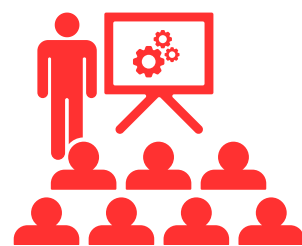

Preparing for the Workforce of Tomorrow



Even in highly developed countries, unemployment remains a global crisis, worsened by a worldwide economic downturn. A significant portion of the unemployed youth comprises individuals who discontinued their education before completing secondary or higher education due to various reasons. The most effective way to tackle this issue is through vocational education, as these individuals lack the necessary skills and qualifications for employment. Recognizing the unemployment challenges and the value of vocational training, **'SAHYOG CARE'** provided vocational training at its numerous centers throughout Delhi. Vocational training refers to an educational program designed to equip individuals with the specialized skills needed for particular occupations, like technicians, artisans, or tradespeople. This training can encompass a mix of classroom instruction and practical, hands-on experience. In India, secondary and higher secondary education typically integrates one or two vocational subjects, but genuine vocational training typically occurs beyond the conventional education system, often culminating in certification. Furthermore, individuals can pursue vocational training as apprentices or trainees, regardless of their formal qualifications.



Programs Offered at Our Vocational Training Centers

We offer a diverse range of courses, such as Basic and Advanced Software Computer Courses, Business Processing Unit (B.P.O.) skills, Retail Management, Entrepreneurship in Beauty and Stitching, Digital Literacy, Data Entry and Tally.

These courses are tailored after a careful analysis of market demands, ensuring that our students acquire the skills needed for meaningful employment opportunities

Vocational Skill Development for Youth:

Sahyog offers free skill development courses to underprivileged and unemployed youth to support their future growth. Upon completion of the courses, we assist students with job placements, achieving approximately **60–70%** placement rates. Every year, around **1,600 to 1,700** students benefit from these programs.

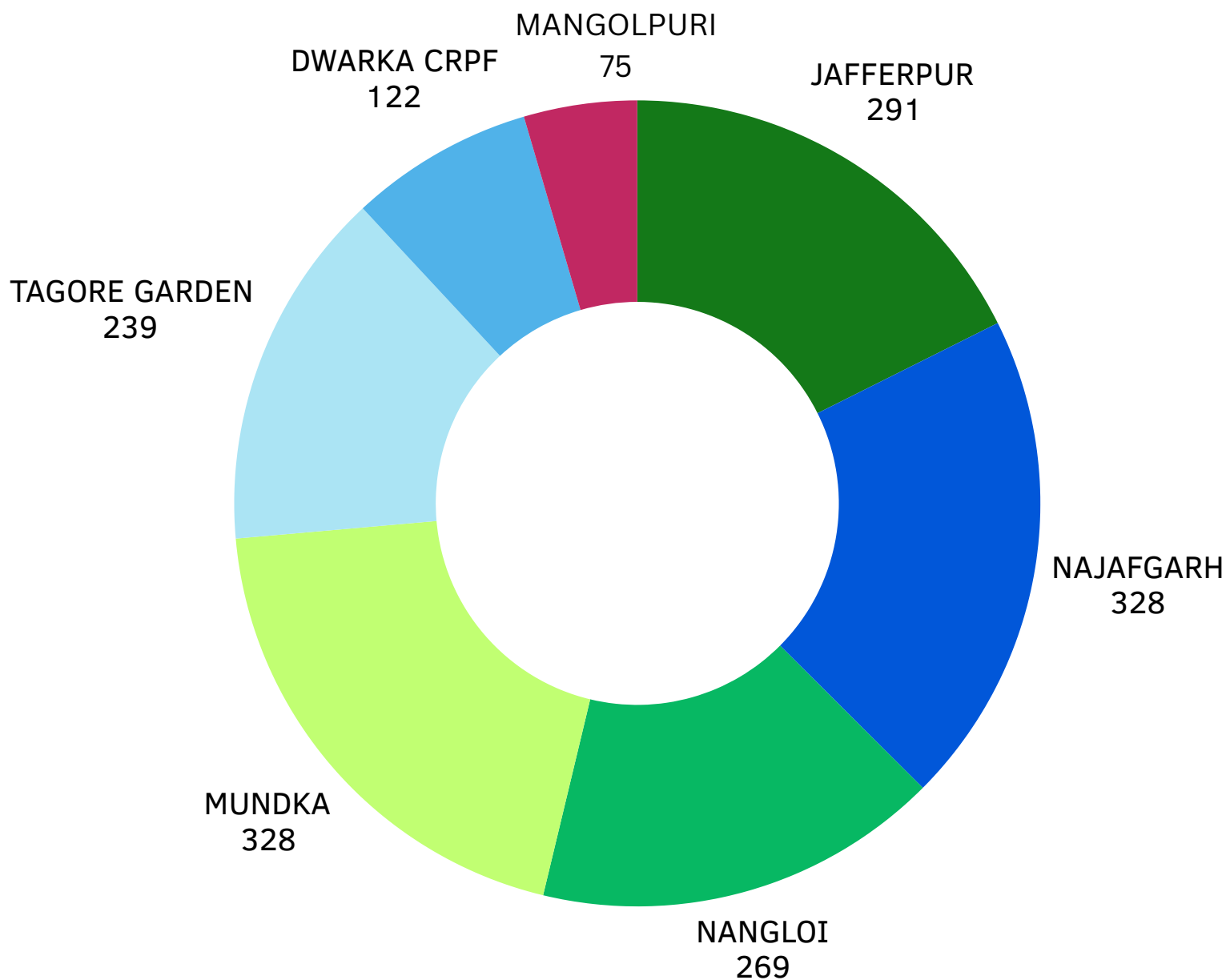

Value of Vocational Skill Development

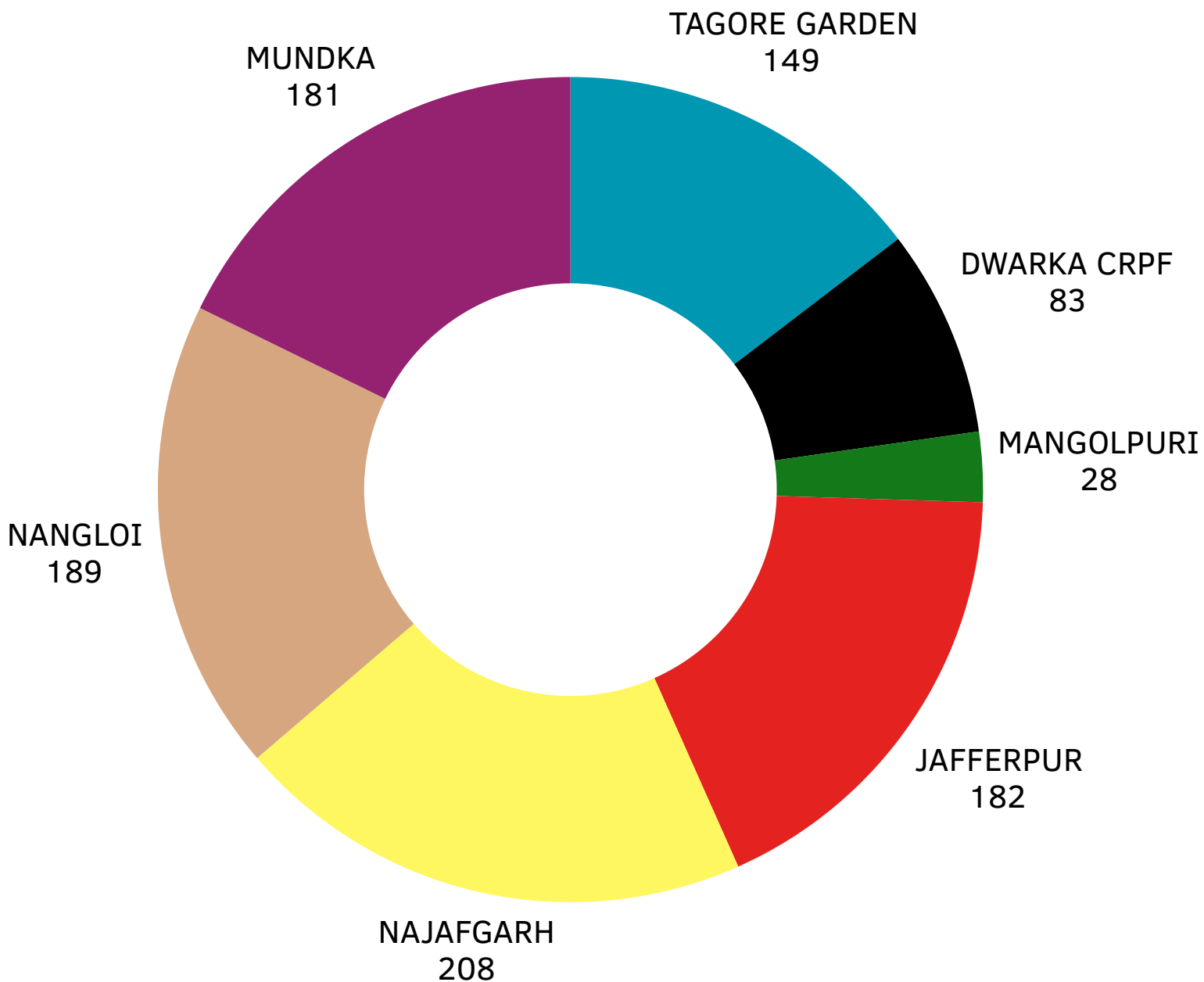

Empowering Change: The Inspiring SHG Journey from Chander Vihar, Delhi

In the bustling lanes of Chander Vihar, Nilothi Extension in Delhi, a quiet revolution is unfolding—led by a group of determined women who have transformed their lives and their community through collective action and resilience.

Defying societal norms and economic hardships, these visionary women united to form a Self-Help Group (SHG), now recognized as a model of grassroots empowerment and sustainable social enterprise. What started as a small initiative has grown into a beacon of change, symbolizing the power of unity and purpose.

A Mission with Impact:

Fueled by the desire to uplift their community, the SHG launched an entrepreneurial venture centered around the production of sanitary napkins, face masks, and eco-friendly bags. Their mission extended beyond income generation—it tackled critical issues of public health, menstrual hygiene, and environmental sustainability.

At the core of their work is the manufacture of sanitary napkins—an essential yet often inaccessible product for many women in urban slums. In a city where millions still face stigma and financial barriers around menstruation, the SHG has provided a lifeline. By producing over **1.2 million sanitary napkins**, they have directly improved the lives of women and girls, ensuring safer and healthier menstrual practices.

Prior to this initiative, many in these underserved communities relied on unhygienic alternatives, exposing themselves to infections and other health risks. Today, thanks to the SHG's efforts, affordable, hygienic products are available—restoring dignity and confidence to countless women.

Economic Independence, Collective Strength:

The initiative has also delivered tangible economic benefits. Each member Now Part Times earns a monthly income of **₹4,000 to ₹5,000**, a crucial step toward financial independence and improved quality of life. But more than the earnings, it's the sense of **pride, purpose, and solidarity** that drives them forward. Through skill-building, shared responsibility, and peer support, these women have cultivated a nurturing ecosystem that empowers them to dream bigger, contribute meaningfully, and challenge entrenched social norms.

A Movement, Not Just a Business:

What began as a modest effort has blossomed into a powerful grassroots movement. The SHG's success is now inspiring neighboring communities to take similar steps toward self-reliance and empowerment. These women have become **role models and changemakers**, demonstrating that **when women rise, entire communities prosper**.

Their story is a testament to what is possible when courage, collaboration, and compassion come together. From Chander Vihar, a new narrative of change is being written—one sanitary napkin, one empowered woman, one thriving community at a time.

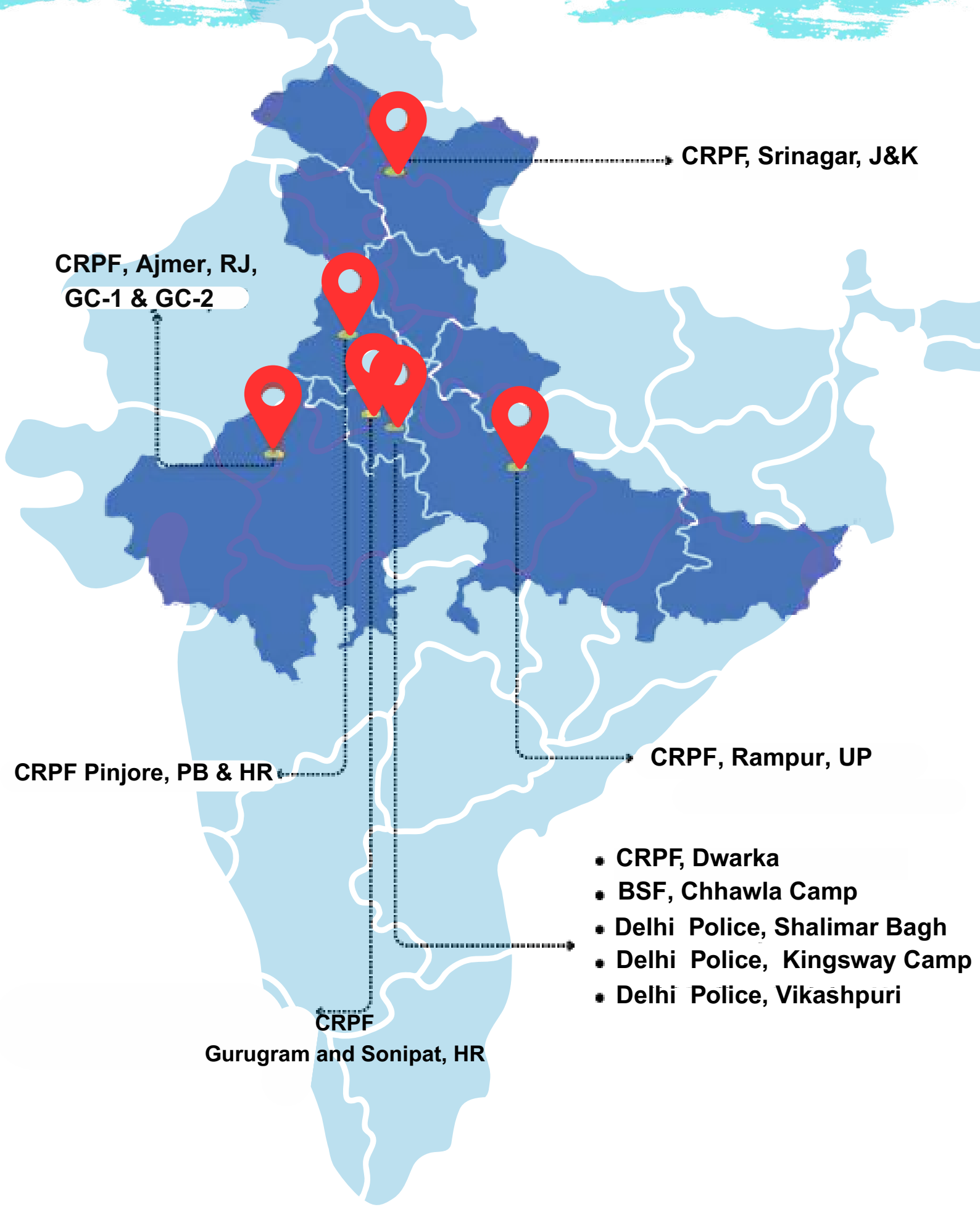

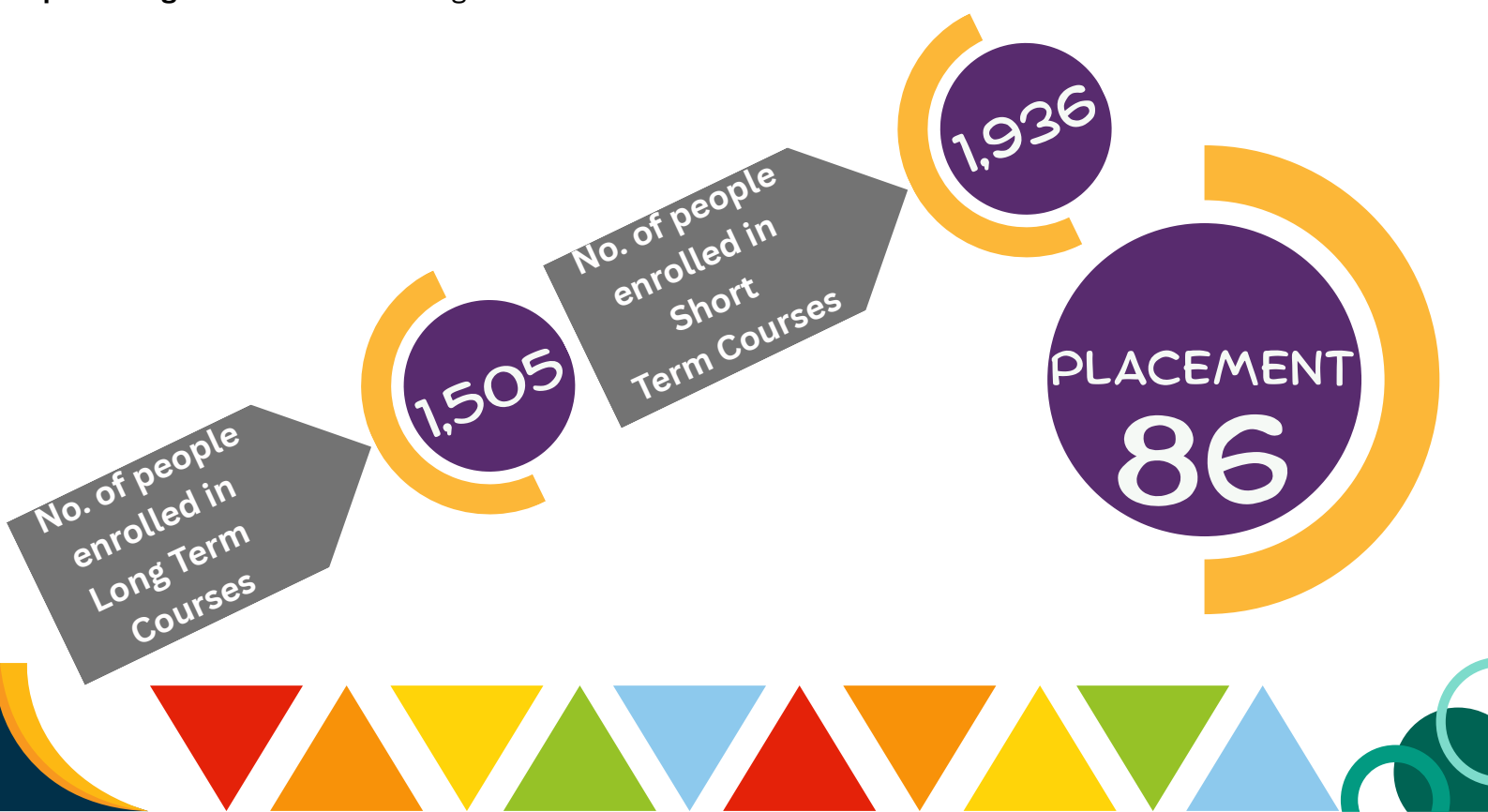

Upon successful completion, participants are actively supported through **job placement assistance**, with Sahyog Care collaborating with a network of companies to secure employment opportunities.

Community & School Water ATM Installation – A Sustainable Livelihood Model for SHGs

Access to Clean Water: A Right, Not a Privilege

In alignment with **Sustainable Development Goal 6**, which seeks to ensure universal and equitable access to safe and affordable drinking water by 2030, **Sahyog Care for You** has dedicated its efforts and resources to providing clean drinking water to underprivileged residents of **Jhuggi clusters**. Water is a vital natural resource, essential for agriculture, industry, household use, recreation, and environmental sustainability. At Sahyog Care, we believe that **access to clean and safe water is a fundamental human right**.

Our Initiative: Empowering Through Access and Entrepreneurship

We have pioneered a **model of self-sufficiency through women's entrepreneurship**, marking a significant step toward both water accessibility and gender empowerment. In collaboration with **BSES, DUSIB, and the Delhi Government**, Sahyog Care launched the **Water ATM Project** across various districts in Delhi.

The Water ATM Project

Under this initiative, a total of **14 Water ATMs** were installed—**11 in community areas and 3 in schools** in high-footfall areas, each serving **1,500 to 2,000 visitors daily**. These Water ATMs dispense **10 liters of safe drinking water for just ₹1**, making clean water affordable and accessible. Beyond access, the initiative **creates employment**, with each ATM staffed by a **team of four**: two operators, one caretaker, and one distributor. In total, these ATMs cater to around **20,000 beneficiaries every day**.

Community Impact

In the financial year **2024–2025**, Sahyog Care provided clean drinking water to approximately **17,000 households daily**, leading to a **notable reduction in waterborne diseases** such as diarrhea, cholera, typhoid, amoebiasis, and Hepatitis A. This initiative has significantly contributed to the **improved health and well-being** of the communities we serve.

Generating Women Entrepreneurs

A key aspect of the Water ATM initiative is **women's empowerment**. By training and supporting women to run and manage these self-sustaining ATMs, we have enabled them to **earn an income, support their families, and develop valuable entrepreneurial skills**. These efforts are helping build a more inclusive and resilient community.

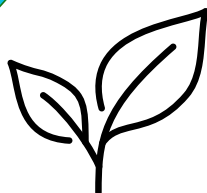
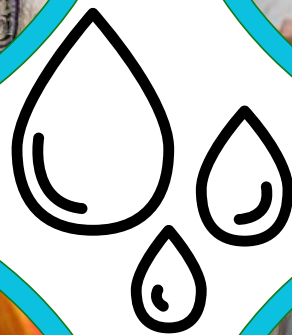

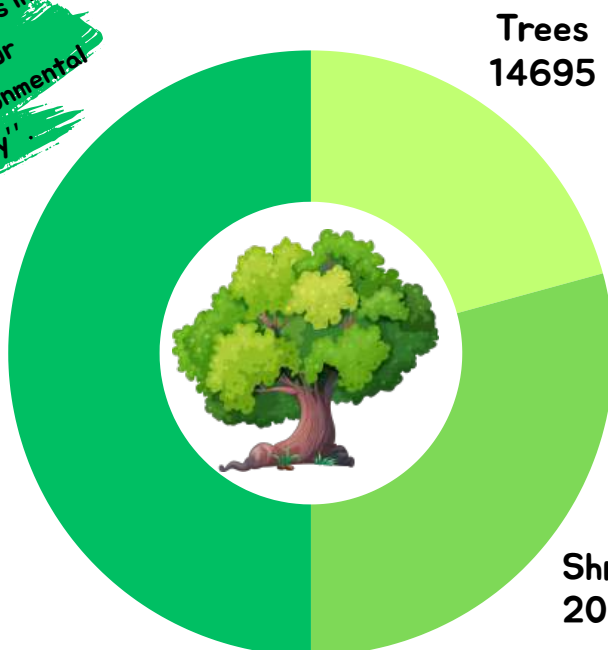
Project Vision

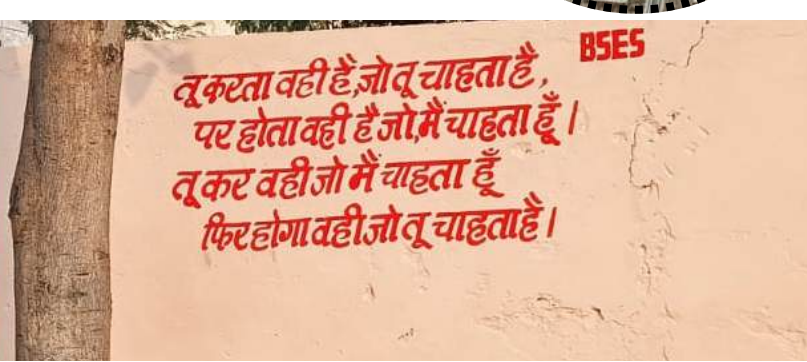

Renewing Cremation Grounds, From Grief to Grace

“Every life and every departure deserves a dignified farewell.”

At the heart of our community lies a sacred space — the crematorium — where emotions converge and memories find their final rest. It is a place that should reflect reverence, respect, and compassion. Yet, this solemn ground stands neglected, burdened by chronic infrastructural shortcomings.

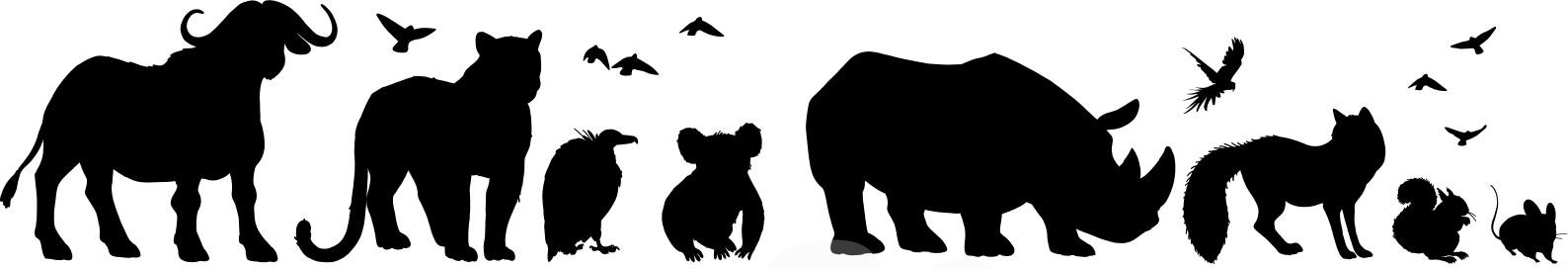
There is no boundary wall to provide privacy, no protective shed to shield mourners from harsh weather, no adequate lighting to offer safety and dignity during evening rites, and no access to a basic water supply. Even the absence of a simple podium with a roof turns a farewell ceremony into a struggle, especially at night, when mourners are forced to rely on handheld torches, casting uneasy shadows over moments meant for peace and closure.

This neglect reflects a broader oversight — the lack of attention and upkeep from local authorities. A place meant to honor life’s final journey is left exposed, inadequate, and unsanitary.

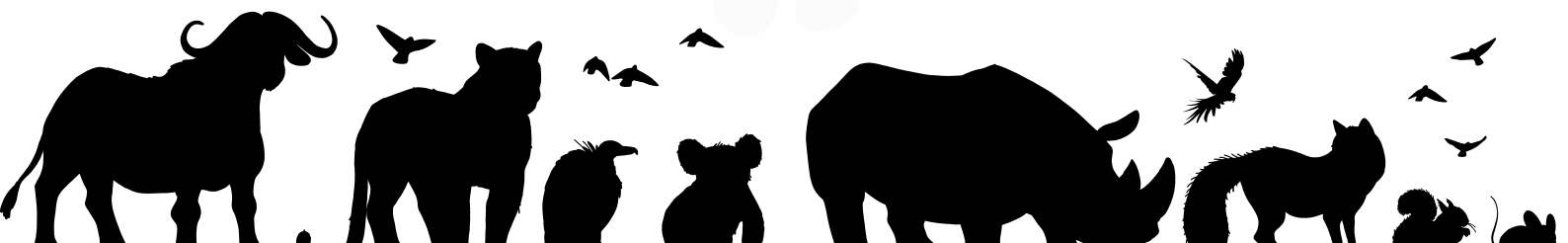
It is time for change.

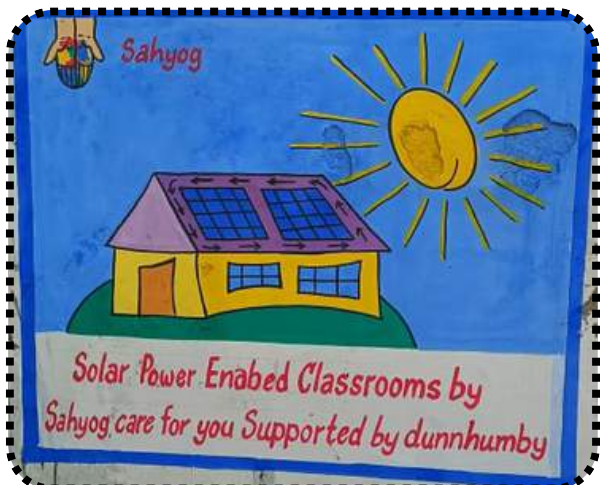
As part of a comprehensive pet cremation ground renovation initiative, a diverse range of civil and electrical works was executed to enhance infrastructure and overall user experience. The project involved the construction of toilet facilities equipped with plumbing, tiling, and electrical fittings to ensure proper sanitation and usability. Extensive painting and beautification works were undertaken, including wall art and slogan writing to promote cleanliness, compassion towards animals, and public awareness. To improve the comfort of visitors and grieving pet owners, three steel seating benches were installed. Artistic wall paintings—featuring animal-themed imagery—were added to create a serene and respectful atmosphere. Special attention was given to the aesthetic enhancement of areas like the Ashti Ghat. Essential utility items such as fans, dustbins, taslas, baaltis, and lotas were also provided to support hygiene and ease of maintenance. This integrated development approach not only upgraded basic amenities but also fostered a more dignified, welcoming, and emotionally supportive environment for pet owners and visitors alike.





Solar Panel Installation

The proposed project aims to install a solar setup at a government school to enhance educational resources and promote renewable energy awareness. By harnessing solar power, the school will have a reliable electricity source, ensuring uninterrupted learning environments. This initiative aligns with sustainability goals, reducing carbon footprint and inspiring students to embrace renewable energy solutions. The solar setup will power educational tools, including computers, projectors, and lighting, fostering a conducive learning atmosphere. Community Park Development

Sahyog Care for You undertook a comprehensive park renovation initiative to transform a 6,000 sq. ft. area that had been long abandoned and covered with thick concrete debris. Before renovation, approximately 4,800 sq. ft. of the park was buried under a 4-foot layer of construction waste. The park lacked basic infrastructure such as proper flooring, pathways, greenery, and functional amenities. Broken boundary structures, two dilapidated police booths, and a non-functional toilet facility further added to its unusable state.

To execute the transformation, a dedicated team of 10–11 workers worked continuously for 35 days. Their efforts began with clearing 40 truckloads of debris and leveling the site for development. A new 9-inch thick, 3-foot-high boundary wall was built on all four sides, and over 4,200 sq. ft. of concrete flooring was laid. Two pedestrian pathways—150 feet by 7 feet and 120 feet by 4 feet—were constructed to ensure easy access across the park. Additionally, a 1,000-liter water tank was installed on a raised platform and connected via 150 meters of pipeline to ensure consistent water supply to the park and rebuilt toilet facility.

Greenery and beautification were central to the renovation. Around 1,800 sq. ft. of fresh grass was planted, complemented by 13 tall bottle palm trees and 550 ornamental and flowering plants placed in well-defined beds. The two police booths were repaired and repainted to restore functionality, while the toilet facility was completely rebuilt with all essential utilities, promoting hygiene and accessibility for public use.

The successful completion of this renovation project has turned the park into a clean, green, and safe recreational space. It now serves the local community as a sustainable public area for leisure and social interaction. This initiative stands as a testament to the impact of focused community development work and the commitment of Sahyog Care for You to urban revitalization.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of SAHYOG CARE FOR YOUTH (hereinafter referred to as the "Company") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2025, and the Statement of Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date annexed and a summary of significant accounting policies and explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

The Society Executive Committee Members are responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Society in accordance with the Society Registration Act, 1990 (the Act). This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India for safeguarding of the assets of the Society and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting principles; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provision of the Act, the accounting and the standards on auditing issued by Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). Schedules to Audited Financial Statements for the ended March 31, 2025

Schedule: Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Accounts:

A Significant Accounting Policies

1 Basis of Accounting: The Financial statements have been prepared to comply in all respects in accordance with the accounting standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). The financials have been prepared under the historical cost convention and on accrual basis except stated otherwise. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Society and except for the changes in accounting policies discussed more fully below, are consistent with those used in the previous year.

2 Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make the estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of financial statements and the result of the operations during the reporting period. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates.

3 Revenue / Expenditure Recognition:

(a) The main income of the Society is from grant and contribution from government agencies, corporate and various development institutions, from Indian as well as foreign Agencies. All grants are recognised on cash basis and expenditure and liabilities are recognised as accrual basis. In the case of programme undertaken with the support of some government and the other agencies, through the funds received are in the nature of

Programs and Execution Charges under a contract, the same is reported as grant in view of the restriction on the expenditure and its nature as reimbursement of expenses.

(b) Interest income on fixed deposits with banks is recognised on time proportion basis taking into the account, the amount outstanding and rate applicable.

(c) Interest income on bank saving balance is recognised as when it is received from the respective banks.

4 Fixed Assets:

1 Fixed assets are stated at cost, after reducing opening accumulated depreciation.
2 Fixed assets purchase are classified as per the nature of assets and record in the books from the date they are purchased and mainly used for the objectives of the society.
3 Assets received as in kind donations are recorded at value provided by donor agencies or at market value as on the date of acquiring such assets from donor.
4 Depreciation has been charged on the assets at the following rates, which in the opinion of the society would cover the normally expected period of useful life of each of the category of assets on written down value method.

5 Valuation of Investments: Investments are held at cost and are valued at market price or cost, whichever is lower, except long term investments made out of corpus and other specified funds. Any diminution in value in respect of all investments, other than long term investments (which are held to maturity withdrawals), are provided in the annual accounts, while appreciation accounted for when realized.

6 Provision and Contingent Liabilities: Society creates a provision where there is a present obligation as a result of past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and reliable estimate can be made of the amount of obligation. A disclosure of contingent liability is made, when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that will probably not require outflow of resources or where reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made.

7 Employees Welfare: Society provides following benefits to their employees as per the terms of employment with them namely.

A. Provident Fund: As per the information provided by the management, the Society is not liable to obtain registration under the Employees' Provident Fund Organisation (EPFO). Accordingly, the Society has not obtained EPFO registration and has not deducted any amount from employees toward provident fund contributions for discharging its statutory liabilities on a monthly basis.

B. Gratuity: Society has not made any gratuity provision for their employees in compliance with statutory authorities.

C. ESIC: As per the information provided by the management, the Society has not obtained registration under the Employees' State Insurance Corporation (ESIC). Accordingly, the Society has not obtained ESIC registration and has not deducted any amount from employees toward provident fund contributions for discharging its statutory liabilities on a monthly basis.

B. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

A. NOTE ON ACTIVITIES OF THE SOCIETY:

1. The Society has undertaken direct welfare projects

(A) For imparting education by way of running Vocational training Center and Coaching Centers for the under privileged

(B) Rehabilitation of street children to the main course of life.
(C) Attending to health and sanitation needs, skill development leading to income generation/ enhancement and community organization.

(D) Cater to the need of differently abled children and mainstreaming them

(E) Provide gender equity and women development for the benefit of the urban poor

(F) The society provides services to the poor in support of these activities in active collaboration with locally formed informal groups among the community itself with a view to make them self-sustaining in these activities and provide financial support to revolve among themselves.

(G) All expenses incurred directly for such purpose either for the individual beneficiaries or for the common use of the groups have been treated as DIRECT PROJECT COST and are so stated in the annual accounts.

(H) In respect of its activities on promotion of skill development, the society has set up service cum training centers, whose expenditure are partly met by the society.

(I) Only direct expenses relating to the projects involving these training and welfare / assistance activities have been charged off (including capital assistance, sanitation improvement, skill training assistance etc.) and all other expenses have been absorbed in the core activities of the organization.

(J) Many assets purchased provided and other infrastructure created for the common welfare of the community in the areas where the Society has been working, though have been in the books of the Society, the physical usage and control of the same have been transferred to the community at large and managed through peer groups.

(K) All the grants/ financial assistance received as well as paid are accounted for on cash basis, whether in capital or revenue nature, as revenue. Though this may be in contradiction to the terms of contract of certain donor agencies, this treatment is given to meet local tax law requirement. Ascertained incomes on investments are also recognized yet, fund wise accounts are also maintained through an integrated accounting system. However, by way of abundant caution all known and ascertained liabilities are provided for.

(L) The expenditure on the projects taken up with the support of donor agencies is, as far as possible incurred according to the plans and the budgets agreed upon. However deviation from agreed plans and budgets often occur at the time of the project execution depending upon various circumstances, such as location awareness among the beneficiaries local customs availability of inputs legal restriction etc. such variations, monitored regularly, are generally intimated to the donor in advance.

Enabling self reliance

1 Any income or grants generated described as community contribution out of the projects supported by foreign funding agencies which is affected under Foreign Contribution Regulation Act taken as Indian Income and so accounted for.
2 In respect of specific fund activities such as sponsorship of specific children who are sponsored perpetually and administered by the society such sponsorship funds are taken to the corpus.

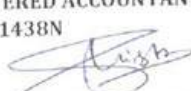

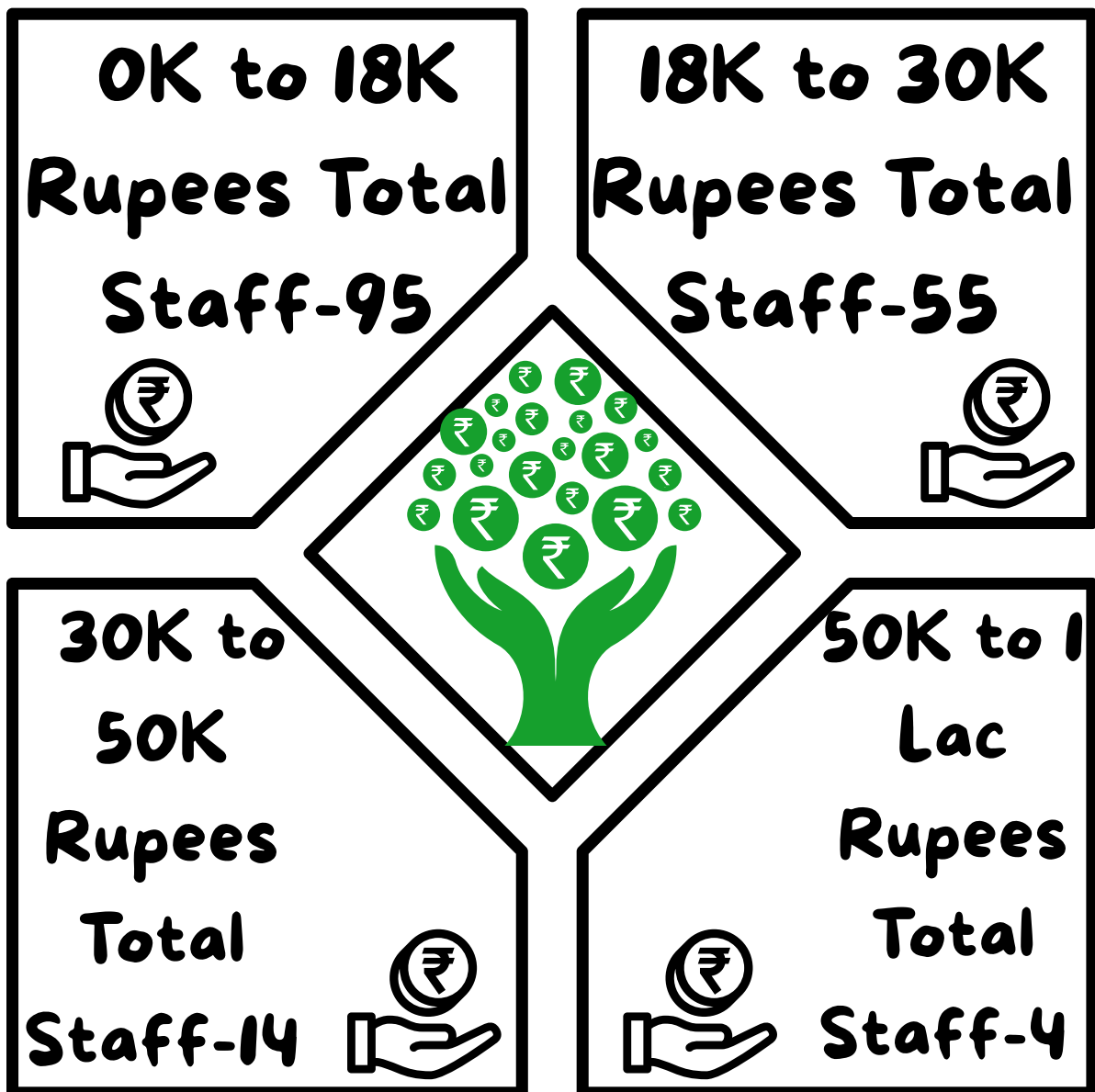
